

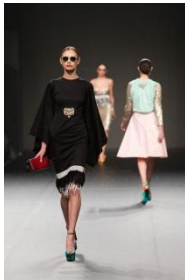

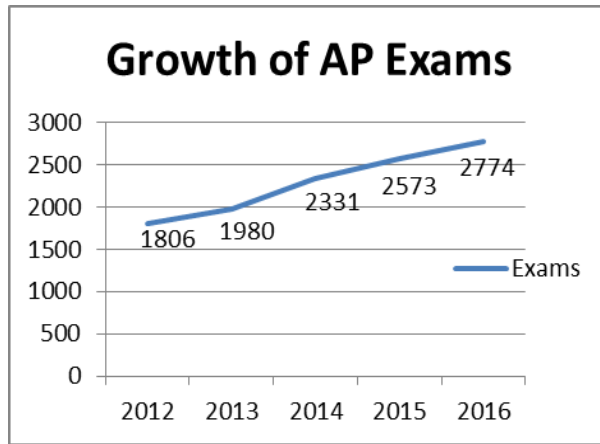
2. To access the Italian university system

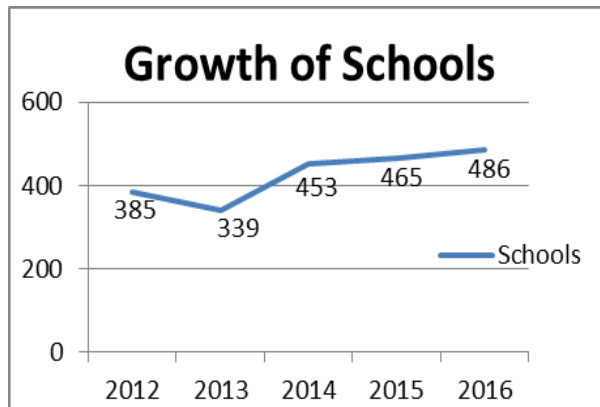
3. To strengthen your professional outlook.
